

**MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING
OF THE TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE OF THE
TOWNSHIP OF WALL, HELD IN THE
MEETING ROOM, MUNICIPAL COMPLEX
TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 25, 2008**

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Devlin at 7:30 P.M. Present were Mayor John P. Devlin presiding, Deputy Mayor Michael J. Clayton, Committeeman Edward H. Thomson, Committeeman Jeffrey W. Foster, Committeeman Clinton C. Hoffman, Township Administrator Joseph L. Verruni, Township Attorney Mark G. Kitrick and Township Clerk Lorraine Kubacz.

Mayor Devlin read the sunshine statement.

Roll-call was taken by Lorraine Kubacz.

Mayor Devlin announced that we were presenting a Proclamation to three Wall residents who participated in America's 9/11 Ride to raise funds for college scholarships for children of first responders. The residents were Chuck Wolf, Jeff Conaty and Drew Hagen. The Mayor congratulated them on their accomplishment. The men stated that they would continue the ride next year and hopefully raise more money.

Comments from Township Committee

Audience Participation

Mayor Randy Bishop from Neptune approached the Committee. Mayor Bishop apologized because it appeared that there was Wall Township bashing about the Shark River dredging. Mayor Bishop stated that it was not their intent to do so and offered his sincere apology. Mayor Bishop noted that often things happen that ignite our passions. The Mayor said he is not against Wall or other neighbors; we are all in this together. Mayor Bishop thanked Mr. Verruni and the Committee for meeting on this issue and stated that he is confident that we will reach beyond this impasse. We all want what is best for our constituents. Mayor Bishop thanked the Committee again for sitting down to talk about what needs to be done. Mayor Devlin thanked Mayor Bishop.

Mayor Arnone from Neptune City also offered an apology for what has transpired with the press. Mayor Arnone stated that when this was discussed five years ago, we all knew this was something that needed to be done and knew that there would be stumbling blocks. This is something we are all working together for a resolution for the shore area. We want to make sure that everyone knows that if it was not for Wall Township and Neptune, this would not happen; we do not have the resources. Without Wall this project would never happen. If we come together we will meet and come to an agreement. Everyone will say that if it was not for these municipalities, there would be no Shark River. Mayor Arnone again apologized and said he is looking forward to working with the Township.

Ed Lippincott, Executive Director of Shark River Clean Up Coalition, stated that we need to improve water quality and dredging is part of the plan. We need to concentrate mostly upstream. All of the members are very concerned and appreciates Wall Township's cooperation. Mr. Lippincott presented a petition to the Township Committee that has been going around. Part of this is online and there are many comments. Mr. Lippincott said that he looks forward to the Township's cooperation in the future.

Kelly Blewitt, Shore Mobile Acres, stated that her mother owns a home and is being harassed by the landlord and the person who runs the Park. Ms. Blewitt's mother has cancer and is being evicted because the owner is stating that Ms. Blewitt

is subletting. There is a caretaker to take care of her mother. Ms. Blewitt asked the Committee for help to stop this man from harassing. Ms. Blewitt stated that she went before the Mobile Home Board. Mr. Verruni asked for the unit number and said that he would look into this.

Bob Forsyth, Riverside Terrace, stated that he has spent his whole life in this area and has always lived around water. Mr. Forsyth stated that he has seen this river get to where it is today. It needs dredging and he heard that things were not progressing. It desperately needs dredging. Everyone will benefit from this because it makes for great fishing, boating sailing, and neighbors all do things together. Mr. Forsyth said that he is glad to see that we are finally going to join with five municipalities and sit down to talk about this. Mr. Forsyth said that if there is anything he can do to help, he will. Mayor Devlin stated that no one on this Committee opposes the dredging. We understand the problem. A lot will be discussed to get a better idea of what is going on.

John Brennan, Spring Lake Heights, said he had a different prospective from others who border the Shark River. In Spring Lake Heights they have been dealing with Wreck Pond. Like all bodies of shore water, the Wreck Pond has filled in with sanitation, mostly storm water in our streets. A friend at the DEP told Mr. Brennan that they look at this, not as bodies of water, but primarily as blight control, so there is little money to do dredging. But there is money now for dredging. Mr. Brennan said he appreciates that Wall Township has concerns about dewatering and understands our concerns. The river is getting progressively worse. It needs to be dredged. The money is available now and this is remarkable, don't lose this opportunity.

Bill Sciarappa, Shark River resident and County Agent in charge of natural resources, said that he serves as technical advisor of water sheds including Wreck Pond. The DEP has \$1.1 Million to help remediate and more to come. Mr. Sciarappa said that he serves on Colts Neck's water shed and is getting all those towns to remediate their problems. There were one or two towns who held back and because of that the DEP held back \$3-4 million that would have helped. We are now in the same situation in the Shark River. We can preserve this natural resource for many generations and said that he hopes the Township acts wisely with other mayors and get the funds which are lined up now. Hopefully, the Township can work out its differences. Dewatering has some complaints, but we need to look to everyone.

Mr. Bennett, non-profit organization interested in coastal resources, especially Shark River, had a written

statement that he presented to the Committee. Mr. Bennett stated that it is premature for Wall Township to commit the eleven acre site at the Camp as a handle facility for this dredging project. There are a number of issues, basically the volume of dredged material can be much smaller than what is in the plan and, as such, there can be a better alternative than the wetlands on the Camp Evans site.

Wilma Morrissey, Wall Environmental Advisory Committee, reminded the Committee that they passed a Resolution November 20, 2007, expressing its opposition to the dewatering for reasons expressed by the Environmental Advisory Committee. They gave forty-four pages of analysis. Everyone is interested in the river, We don't dispute dredging, but the Committee did its homework. There is no viable alternative on this. The EAC still opposes the wetland site with the bald eagle on the north side of Marconi Road and hopes that the Committee will support them.

Heather Safford, Clean Ocean Action, a regional coalition, supports the dredging and recognizes its importance. But filling in eleven acres of wet lands as a dewatering facility raises serious questions. Wall Township is wise and correct to stand firm. This plan does not provide a detailed plan to avoid an impact. Ms. Safford asked who would own the site and take responsibility for it, what is it contaminated with and how long will dewatering take. The DEP has not addressed reasons for dredging. Ms. Safford said that she supports Wall Township's interests.

Committeeman Foster complemented Ms. Safford on her statements and stated that these are the exact questions that he has. These questions arose during the meetings with the Mayors. The river has bald eagles, egrets, herons and osprey. Mr. Foster said that he agrees that it needs to be dredged, but the question is where do we put the material. There are 12-13 options. Mr. Foster said he would hate to see the wetlands gone.

Mayor Devlin said that this Committee does not have a full understanding of this right now. We all want the river dredged. After the meeting on Tuesday, the Committee will have more of an understanding to give answers.

Ryan Loughman, Marconi Road, said that he is definitely for the dredging but is concerned as a waterfront owner. Mr. Loughman said that he spoke in Avon about erosion issues that could arise. Mayor Devlin responded that these are questions that the Committee needs addressed. Mr. Loughman said his concern is that this is our responsibility. We need to keep this clean. Mr. Loughman had a new bulkhead put in and there

is a higher liability that he is concerned about. The regulation of speed and will it be enforced. There will be jet skiers and larger vehicles. Committeeman Foster said that this is also one of his concerns but only the channels will be done not the whole river. It ends at the North of Marconi Road. Mr. Loughman said that at high tide, there are serious vessels going very fast. Committeeman Foster said that this will all be addressed at the meeting on Tuesday.

Don Herbert, Atlantic Avenue, had a question about the Newsletter of Spring/Summer 2008. It states that trash will be picked up the Monday after Veterans Day. Mrs. Kubacz explained that this was a misprint and that she already spoke with Ken Critchlow at Public Works about this. This will be fixed for the next Newsletter.

Bob McAllen, Co-chair for the Restoration of Camp Evans, said that he is familiar with the situation at Camp Evans. The Committee did its best to preserve it. Whatever pollution was on the site has been remediated. There is PCB contamination in the river. They are testing that but it is out of their jurisdiction. Any dredging can produce detrimental contamination. This can not land in the wet lands. Mr. McAllen also asked about dredging over a ten year span taking 1-1½ million tons from the river. Committeeman Foster said that they will only dredge the channels, not the river. This would have done nothing for the problems in the river.

Mr. Foster said that if the Township uses the 11+ acres proposed, because of weight limitations, it would take 15-18 yards per truck, 8,000 truck loads coming out of that site and asked if anyone has done an environmental study for trucks on Route 18. None of this has been considered. The quality of life for people on the Brighton Avenue, nothing has been done about the impact to the residents in Wall Township. Next Tuesday this will all be taken into account. The RAD is in favor of dredging, but it is important to serve all the communities, not just one. Mr. Foster asked Mr. McAllen how much it cost to remove the PCB's at Camp Evans. Mr. McAllen said about \$40 million and still counting.

There being no further comments, Committeeman Thomson made a motion to adjourn. Committeeman Foster seconded the motion and all members voted yes. The meeting adjourned at 8:30 p.m.
